


SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER (Sunday of Divine Mercy)

Doubting Thomas Jn 20:19-31

I understand this is a true story from here in the U.S. The owner of a certain bar in one of the southern states decided to expand its facilities. The local church, which disapproves of drinking alcohol, started a prayer campaign to prevent the bar from expanding. Construction on the bar progressed up until the week before the grand opening when lightning struck and burned the entire bar to the ground. After the bar burned, the church folks started bragging about "the power of prayer." So, the bar owner sued the church on the grounds that the church "was ultimately responsible for the demise of his building, either through direct or indirect action or means." In response to the accusation, the church denied all responsibility to the burning of the building. The judge read through the bar owner's charges and the church's response and commented, "I don't know how I'm going to rule on this, but it appears that we have a bar owner who believes in the power of prayer, and an entire Baptist church congregation that now does not." Our Gospel today touches on several themes, with faith being one of them. Jesus offers His friends His own special peace. He gives them a commission to continue His work: "as the Father has sent Me, so I send you." As a helper in this ministry, He gives them the Holy Spirit, and one of the works of Jesus they would do was to forgive sins. This passage gave rise to the designation of this Sunday as Divine Mercy Sunday. God's mercy, however, is not limited to this one Sunday. God is ready to forgive us any time we approach Him with true sorrow for our sins.

Then we have the memorable story of Thomas who missed Jesus' first appearance and refused to believe in Jesus' resurrection until he had concrete proof. Jesus gave it to him the following week. Yes, God is ready to forgive us, but we must have a complete trust in His mercy. Our first reading, from the Acts of the Apostles, describes this beautiful way of life as it was practiced by the first Christians.



"They devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of the bread and to the prayers." And "They ate their meals with exultation and sincerity of heart, praising God and enjoying favor with all the people." This is a snapshot of the very first community of Christian stewards living out their daily life — embracing prayer (the breaking of the bread), formation (the teaching of the apostles), hospitality (the communal life and fellowship through joyful meals together), and mutual service. What an inspiration to us modern-day stewards!

The Easter season is not the time to let up in the practice of our faith now that Lent is behind us. Rather, it is a time to live our faith with deeper joy and gratitude as we bask in the celebration of our Lord's victory over sin and death for us. St. Peter summarizes this Easter outlook eloquently in our second reading. Our daily lives should be a reflection of this attitude: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who in His great mercy gave us a new birth to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is... kept in heaven for you." St. Peter acknowledges that life can be difficult however, saying that "In this you rejoice, although now for a little while you may have to suffer through various trials."

From the gospel story of this weekend, we learn that there is hope for all of us in this age of anxiety. There is help when we feel like giving up. There is courage when we are tempted to hide. For there is One who can enter any room. There is One who can overcome any problem. There is One who can bring peace to every anxious heart. In fact, today He holds out His hands to us and shows us His side and says, "Peace be with you. Do not be doubting. But believe." In Jesus' name, Amen.

Hope Lives After Easter!

At Easter, we relive the story of how a shameful and bloody crucifixion transformed into a winning resurrection to everlasting life. We marvel again at Calvary where sin and death were conquered forever. Christ died in our place—the Righteous One for the unrighteous; the Sinless One for the sinful; the Holy God for the ungodly.

The high spirit of Easter morning is like no other day. And yet shouldn't we celebrate the wonder of our living hope (1 Peter 1:3–5) each day of the year? Must we wait for Easter to roll around again to reclaim joy and hope?

Hope doesn't come naturally to most of us even if we're glass-half-full kinds of people. Even I wrestled with writing this article while hope was slowly draining from my heart.

But there's good news . . . the more hope is practiced, the more hope grows.

Start building your hope chest with these confident expectations:

- Hope is putting your faith for tomorrow into action today.
- Hope is strengthened when you're surrounded by faith-filled friends and family.
- The empty tomb of Easter is proof Christians are never without hope.





