SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER: John 17:1-11a Happy Mother's Day!

Jesus was asked one time what the most important commandment in the law is. We know how He answered. He not only gave us the most important commandment but the second most important commandment as well, two commands that perfectly complement each other: to love God with our whole heart and soul and mind and strength, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Jesus gave us the answer not only by His words but also by the way He lived.

I would like to reflect today on how Jesus showed love for His Father. His perfect obedience was one way, and another was by spending time with His Father in prayer. That is what we especially want to focus on today. The topic of prayer was inspired by today's Gospel, which is part of Jesus' prayer at the Last Supper. We have little or no information about what His life was like before Jesus began public ministry. The little information we do have shows us that Joseph and Mary were faithful in their Jewish observances. Thus, Jesus would have been brought up in that tradition, going to synagogue on the Sabbath and going to the Temple in Jerusalem annually for Passover. St. Luke tells us that when Jesus was beginning His ministry, he went to Nazareth and went to the synagogue on the Sabbath according to custom.

My main point in today's reflection is simply to point out the prayerfulness of Jesus. We see in the first reading how Jesus' followers imitated His example as they gathered in prayer in the upper room after the Ascension, waiting for the coming of the Holy Spirit.

In his book Teach Us to Pray, Louis Evely wrote, "Too many Christians regard God as pilots regard their parachute, namely, good if needed, but better if they can get along without it." We might wonder why Jesus would need to pray. He was already as close to the Father as He possibly could be. I am sure there are many reasons why Jesus prayed, but this question might best be answered with another question, "Why do we need to spend time with those who are important to us, with those whom we love?" A true disciple of our Lord will make prayer a priority in their lives, and by "prayer" I mean more than just a rapidly recited Our Father or Hail Mary. Prayer is spending time with our God. Do we feel like we're too busy? Today we come together for the greatest prayer there is, the Eucharist. As we gather in prayer today, we are not alone, and I don't mean simply that there are others when go to church, this week or next week with us. Christ Himself is with us, and it is in union with His perfect sacrifice of love and obedience on the cross that we offer our prayers and praise to God our Father.

At the beginning of today's reflection, I mentioned the relationship between the greatest commandment and this weekend's Gospel. Coincidentally, it's Mother's Day today. And you cannot talk about mothers without talking about love. A mother and father who had been married to one another for 55 years were living in California. They had a son who lived in New York and a daughter who lived in Chicago. It was the day before Mothers' Day and the father called his son and

told him, "I have bad news for you. After 55 years of misery, your mother and I are calling it quits. We're getting a divorce." The son went ballistic. He tried to tell his father they couldn't do that. He called his sister and they both decided to fly to California right away to talk to their parents and straighten them out. They called their folks and told them they would be there the next day. The father hung up the phone, turned to his wife and said, "The kids will be home for Mothers' Day and they are paying their own way!" Happy Mothers' Day to all our mothers. I hope you get a visit from your children or at least a phone call.

There was a short article in US News and World Report recently that said if stay-at-home moms were to be compensated according to what they are worth, they would command a salary of over \$134,000 a year. As for working moms, they deserve to be paid nearly \$86,000 a year just for their household duties, including those of chef, accountant, teacher, chauffeur, and nurse. Of course, a mother's true worth can't be measured in dollars and cents; they are priceless. Today on Mothers' Day we recall one of the people who gave us life. Sometimes when people get older, they want to know even more about their origins. Occasionally in our parish office we get phone calls asking us if we have records about someone's grandparents, great grandparents or even further back. I only wish I had asked and had written down more about my own ancestors before my parents had died.

This is Mother's Day weekend, and we have a lot to talk about mothers but it's really impossible to explain the role of a mother in any society. A friend recently told me that any preacher who dares to get up and speak on Mother's Day faces at least three problems, or dangers. The three dangers he was speaking of are the danger of "being an expert," the danger of using Mary as the model of motherhood, and the danger of facing a very mixed congregation. The danger of being an expert: you all know the story of the priest who got up and spoke at great length on the glories of motherhood. And when he walked outside a woman came up to him and said, "Father, I wish I knew as little about being a mother as you do." Or the other priest who preached about Mary as the perfect model to be a wife and mother. And a woman came up to him, carrying one baby and with four other children following her, and said, "It's easy enough for her with her one child." And then, our congregation is mixed. We celebrate Mother's Day. We talk about and honor mothers. And yet many of our congregation are not mothers, and some, like me, are not married and are not women. Nevertheless, what we all have in common is we've all had a mother. We've all had the experience of a mother and that justifies speaking about her.

Some mothers are clever. Some are devious. There's a story about a young man who was walking through a supermarket to pick up a few things when he noticed an old woman following him around. Thinking nothing of it, he ignored her and continued. Finally, he went to the checkout line, but this older woman got in front of him. "Pardon me," she said, "I'm sorry if my staring at you has made you feel uncomfortable. It's just that you look like my son, who just died recently." And she wiped away a tear. "I'm very sorry," replied the young man. "Is there anything I can do for you?" "Yes," she said with a sigh, "As I'm leaving, would you say 'Goodbye, Mother/' It would make me feel so much better." "Sure," answered the young man. As the old woman





WHAT IS EUCHARISTIC ADORATION?

The practice of Eucharistic Adoration is a centuries old ritual and falls within a broader category of devotions and rituals that are associated with the Sacrament of the Eucharist. In a particular way, Eucharistic Adoration is an extension of the worship and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament that occurs in every Mass.

Several parishes throughout the United States have introduced the practice of perpetual Eucharistic Adoration, while other communities have the custom of shorter periods of Eucharistic Adoration.

Although adoration of the Blessed Sacrament can never take the place of Eucharistic Communion, many Catholics find great comfort and consolation in their prayers before the Eucharist enshrined in the tabernacle or when it is exposed in the monstrance (both are equally valid, as the Christ is not more present in one than in the other). But when we consider our eucharistic devotions, it is always important to remember the fundamental connection these acts of devotion have to the celebration of the Eucharist in the Mass and reception of Christ in Communion. ©LPi

was leaving, he called out, "Goodbye, Mother!" She waved back at him and disappeared through the supermarket door. As he stepped up to the checkout counter, he saw that his total was \$127.50. "How can that be?" he asked, "I only purchased a few things!" The clerk looked over the top of his reading glasses and said, "Your mother said that you would pay for her."

In the Gospel of John 15:5; Jesus says, "I am the Vine and you are the branches..." For most of us, our mother is the Vine mentioned in that Gospel. We carry her vitality with us wherever we go, even after our mothers have passed on. No matter how far we may stray from our mother's home or our mother's teachings, we still are the Branch that is attached spiritually to that Vine. It still gives us life.

And so, I end with Sister José Hobday's remembrance of her life-giving mother, who was a Seneca Indian. What she writes is for all of us, mothers or not. "I was about six years old at the time. I was sitting outside on a block of concrete, and I was crying. I don't even know why. I was just crying and crying. My mother came along and said, "What's the matter?" I said, "Nothing. Leave me alone!" She did—and then I really started crying. About 15 minutes later she came back and sat beside me. "You know," she said, "I have to tell you something. There are going to be a lot of times in your life when you are going to cry, and you won't know why. You won't understand and neither will anybody else. You can marry the nicest man in the world, but at times like this, he won't know what to do to help you stop crying."

Then she said she was going to teach me a prayer for the times when I was crying and didn't know why. She made me get off the cement block and stand up. She said, "Now put your arms around yourself." I did, but it wasn't good enough for her. "You're just folding your arms," she said. "Put them all the way around yourself. Cuddle your body. Hold yourself the way you would hold a baby in your arms. Now after you have a real good hold of yourself, close your eyes and begin to rock yourself. Rock yourself really good, the way you would a baby, and just keep doing it. When you grow up, no matter how old you are, and you find yourself crying and you don't know why, I want you to rock yourself just like this. And as you do it, remember that you are God's little girl, and that God understands why you are crying, even if no one else does. And remember, too, that God holds you close, just the way you are holding yourself, because God loves you very much. Then just keep rocking yourself and be comforted." Sister Hobday adds, "Isn't that a good prayer? I recommend it for you, too. Just stand wherever you are—in the kitchen, in the shop, or in the bathroom—and wrap your arms around yourself as tightly as you can. Rock yourself. Before long, you will be able to feel God holding you in the same way you are holding yourself. You will be comforted the way you were comforted as a child when your mother held you in her arms and rocked you."


Faith Formation
