

Pentecost Sunday: John 20:19-23 Memorial Day Weekend

One Saturday night a minister was busy writing his sermon for Sunday. His little daughter saw him working busily and asked him what he was doing. He said he was writing his sermon. She asked, "Daddy, how do you know what to write?" He answered, "God tells me what to write." Then she asked, "Why do you keep erasing."

Sometimes it's very clear and sometimes it's challenging to know what God is saying to us. I felt pretty much like that minister as I was trying to figure out just what I should say about the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. And, I was wondering how to say a word or two on this Memorial Day weekend. So much could be said about Pentecost, "the Birthday of the Church," and yet, when we finish saying everything that could be said, we will still be dealing with the great mystery of who is the Holy Spirit and the Spirit's mysterious workings in us and in the Church. It's a great mystery because God is too awesome and too great for us to understand. The happenings on the day of Pentecost seemed so bizarre, with the sound of a rushing mighty wind, tongues of fire resting on the participants, and the speaking in other languages, that it caused the onlookers to conclude, "They are filled with new wine." In other words, "They are drunk!" Peter observed that they were confusing inspiration with inebriation, so he declared, "Men of Judea and all who dwell in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and give ear to my words. For these men are not drunk, as you suppose, since it is only the third hour of the day; but this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel." (Acts 2:14b-16)

Our world is a world of power. Political power. Military power. Financial power. Institutional power. A power that can be destructive to the human spirit and freedom, becoming restrictive, oppressive, confining, and threatening. At Pentecost we celebrate the coming of a new kind of power. A power to set free. A power that can cause the lame to walk, the blind to see, and release the addict from his addiction. A power to release the captive, that can turn boredom into usefulness, dreariness to radiance, and narcissistic selfcenteredness to a life of joyous self-giving. I am talking about power that can take our dry bones of inactivity and listlessness and create a life of effervescent joy and radiance.

That power is the presence of the Holy Spirit. Jesus said to His disciples, "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you . . ." On that first Pentecost, 120 lukewarm believers were ignited with the flame and zeal of the Holy Spirit. On that day Peter stood up and preached the sermon of his life, and before the day ended over 3,000 people committed themselves to the Christian way. These courageous and committed souls went out and in the words of Luke "turned the world upside down." This is why we call Pentecost the birthday of the church. It is a wild, weird, and wonderful day that burst upon Jerusalem nearly 4

2,000 years ago. The miracle of Pentecost was that they were able to hear and understand each other. This is why Paul lists the gifts of the Spirit as healing, prophecy, teaching, tongues, and the "greatest" gift—love. Love brings an openness to one another. Love makes understanding possible.

Pentecost is the miracle of hearing being restored. Here were people from the four corners of the earth, different in language and culture, but they were able to hear one another. What a miracle. A miracle almost unknown in our world today. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all of these speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us in our own native language?" Acts 2:7-8 It is the tragic inability to hear one another, to understand one another, that is miraculously healed at Pentecost. This is why Pentecost has been characterized as the Tower of Babel in reverse. Although the plan of God was frustrated in Genesis 11, it was accomplished in Acts 2. From Babel to Pentecost has been characterized as the movement from dissidence to harmony.

How tragic is this problem of our not being able to hear one another. Whites do not hear blacks. The affluent, you and I, do not hear the voices of the poor. Adults do not hear the muffled cries of the abused child. We have insulated ourselves from the agonizing voice of the AIDS victim. We seem to have given up on the power of Pentecost, which enables strangers to hear one another. The miracle of Pentecost assures us that the creative work of the Holy Spirit still seeks to restore us to what we were created to be, creatures able to hear and to understand each other.

I cannot conclude this reflection without mentioning something on this Memorial Day weekend. Let me sum up it all by fittingly recalling a war movie, Steven Spielberg's Saving Private Ryan, where a squadron of young soldiers, you recall, is sent on a mission to find one soldier behind enemy lines and bring him home. Most of the young men in the squadron, including the captain, die in the rescue attempt. As he lies dying, the captain's last words to Private Ryan are, "Earn this." Many years later, Private Ryan, now an old man, visits the grave of his captain. As he kneels at the grave, he says, "Not a day goes by I don't think about what happened . . . And I just want you to know, I've tried. Tried to live my life the best I could. I hope that's enough. I didn't invent anything. I didn't cure any diseases. I worked a farm. I raised a family. I lived a life. I only hope, in your eyes at least, I earned what you did for me."

A good sentiment for us today on Memorial Day. A hoped-for sentiment for someone tomorrow who will remember us.




