Weeds Among The Wheat: Matthew 13:24-30

Last weekend, we talked about planting seeds. This week we're talking about pulling weeds. The two go together. Every gardener knows that planting seeds is the easy part of having a successful garden. It is much more time consuming to weed that same garden, and it's hard work. Someone said, "When weeding, the best way to make sure you are removing a weed and not a valuable plant is to pull on it. If it comes out of the ground easily, it is a valuable plant." There is a corollary to that truth. "To distinguish flowers from weeds, simply pull up everything. What grows back is weeds."

Some of you may relate to one unknown homemaker who wrote, "I don't do windows because I love birds and don't want one to run into a clean window and get hurt. I don't wax floors because I am terrified a guest will slip and get hurt, then I'll feel terrible (plus they may sue me.). I don't disturb cobwebs because I want every creature to have a home of their own. I don't Spring Clean because I love all the seasons and don't want the others to get jealous. I don't put things away because my husband will never be able to find them again. I don't do gourmet meals when I entertain because I don't want my guests to stress out over what to make when they invite me over for dinner. I don't iron because I choose to believe them when they say, 'Permanent Press.' And finally, I don't pull weeds in the garden because I don't want to get in God's way. He is an excellent designer!"

I doubt then if anyone likes pulling weeds, including God. In today's lesson, Jesus tells a parable likening the kingdom of heaven to a man who sowed good seed in his field and whose enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat while everyone was sleeping. When the wheat sprouted and formed heads, then the weeds also appeared. The owner's servants came to him and asked if he wanted them to pull up the weeds. "No," he answered, "because while you are pulling the weeds, you may root up the wheat with them. Let both grow together until the harvest. At that time, I will tell the harvesters to first collect the weeds and tie them in bundles to be burned; then gather the wheat and bring it into my barn."

When His disciples asked Him to explain the parable, Jesus answered, "The one who sowed the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world, and the good seed stands for the sons of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sows them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the harvesters are angels. As the weeds are pulled up and burned in the fire, so it will be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send out His angels, and they will weed out of His kingdom everything that causes sin and all who do evil. They will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear."

On its surface, there is not much to be said about this parable except to make sure you're not a weed, because one day the weeds will be thrown into the fiery furnace. The weeds are all those "who do evil." Oops. That's a little disconcerting. All "who do evil." Where does God draw the line? Murderers? Rapists? Adulterers? Thieves? Does fibbing on your tax returns count? How about gossiping, particularly if it borders on bearing false witness? How about the sins of omission? What about those who ignore their neighbors who are in need? How about those who give only a pittance to God after God has been so generous to them? Where is the line drawn? Could it be that Paul was right when he said in Romans 3:23, "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God?" Of course, He was. What is our hope then? Is

it not that the blood of Christ covers all our sins? I don't know about you, but a fiery furnace doesn't appeal to me, and if that day comes when God begins pulling weeds I certainly don't want to depend on my own virtue. Having said that, however, we need to take this lesson seriously.

Pulling weeds is an important part of a successful life. There was an interesting report in the news a while back about an event designed for college kids. The purpose was to get them to take weeds seriously. One pundit called it "the World Series of weeds" and "the Hula Bowl of herbicides." Agriculture students from universities in the U.S. and Canada competed in being able to identify weeds and to prescribe the right chemical to kill them. "They need to be able to recognize weeds when they are tiny," said James Worthington of Western Kentucky University, president of the North Central Weed Science Society. "When [weeds] get big enough that anybody can recognize them, it's too late to do anything about them." (Spokesman Review, July 27, 1989, p. A9.)

That's an important statement: "When [weeds] get big enough that anybody can recognize them, it's too late to do anything about them." How many parents have been too late recognizing the weeds growing in the life of their young person, weeds like drugs or depression or running with the wrong crowd? For that matter, how many adults have recognized too late that vices like alcohol or tobacco or gambling or some other addiction has them in its grasp. Or, even more likely, negative attitudes bitterness, resentment, bigotry. We don't talk too much about such things in the church. We don't want to sound judgmental. But maybe we should talk more about the weeds that despoil human existence. Lives are still being destroyed. Hearts are still being broken. Relationships are being torn. And here's the sad thing. The people whose lives are being choked by these weeds are, for the most part, not bad people. They are good people who simply weren't vigilant about pulling the weeds.

But things are not that simple. Human beings are complex — and that includes each of us. We are an extraordinary mixture of good and bad. Moreover, the roots of good are so entwined with the roots of evil that one can't be pulled up one without pulling up the other.

We must learn to be patient and lenient towards ourselves in the first place. We must be hospitable towards all that we are. We must acknowledge the dark side of ourselves, without conceding victory to it. We must struggle on despite the weeds, confident that with God's help, the good will finally triumph. It is through struggle that we grow, provided we don't throw the towel in.

And we must then be lenient towards others. Even though we see only part of a person's life we tend to rush to judgment. We are too quick to classify people, and once we have classified them as evil, for them there is no redemption. Only God has the right and the knowledge to judge; yet God is patient and tolerant. By concentrating on people's vices, we become blind to their virtues. We are too eager to voice our criticisms, but reluctant to give a single word of encouragement, and in this way we bar every road to improvement. Therefore, let us not knock others. Let us seek the good in everyone, reveal it, bring it out. A person will be judged, not by a single act or stage in his life, but by his whole life. That is why judgment can't come until the end. A man may make a great mistake, but by the grace of God redeem himself. Of what else but flawed creatures does God make saints? Attempts to hide the streakiness of our holy people, though sometimes successful, are always dishonest (Anthony de Mello). Jesus offers today's parable so that we will practice mercy, not judgment. "Let me do the weeding," the Master Gardener says. Amen.

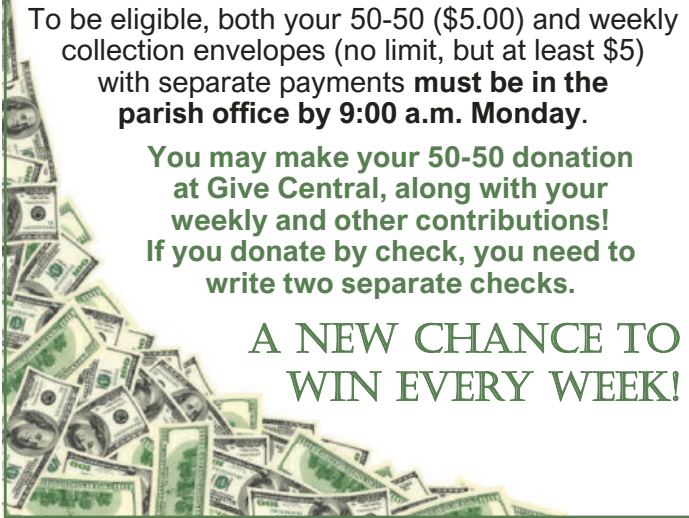

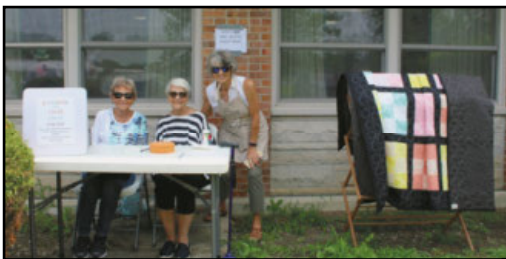

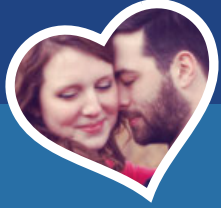
