Thirty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Christ the King

Happy Thanksgiving! I hope and pray that you are all still in a festive mood of gratitude. The readings today, especially the Gospel, all reflect how we can be thankful by sharing what we have with those around us. I kindly ask you to read the bulletin to look at our Advent and Holiday calendar and prepare to celebrate with us those days ahead.

Jesus' first major sermon in the Gospel according to Matthew is the Sermon on the Mount. It begins with the Beatitudes, one of which is, "Blessed are the merciful, for they will obtain mercy." Today's Gospel from Matthew is the last of Jesus' major sermons, and it dramatically portrays what Jesus means by "blessed are the merciful." This is one of the best known of Jesus' parables. It tells us, first, that at the end of time there will be only two kingdoms: the kingdom of God, where there will be happiness beyond anything we can imagine, and the kingdom of Satan, where there will be endless remorse and suffering. Notice that we're the ones who make the decision as to which kingdom we will belong. We make that choice not by what we say but by the way we live. The parable tells us that Jesus is the Son of Man, a mysterious heavenly being to whom God grants dominion, glory and kingship (Daniel 7, 14). Jesus has God for his Father (Mt. 25,34) He is called "king," which indicates Messiah and Son of David in Matthew, and is also called "Lord" (Mt. 25, 37). He is both judge and shepherd. Jesus' identity was hidden, except in the things that He did (forgiving sins, interpreting the Law, healing the sick, raising the dead, and various other miracles), but here Jesus appears in all His glory.

The usual interpretation of today's Gospel is that "all the nations" (all of us humans) need to respond to the needs of people experiencing some form of distress, "these least brothers of mine." A person might ask what about going to Church on Sunday? What about the other commandments? Aren't those things important? Of course, they are. Jesus did say the first and greatest commandment is to love God with our whole heart soul and mind and strength. Loving God involves more than giving a sandwich to a hungry person or giving a cup of water to a thirsty person. It does include these, but it also includes prayer and worship and keeping the commandments. "If you love me, you will keep my commandments," Jesus told His disciples at the Last Supper.

The fact that in Jesus, God became human and lived among us, meant He ran the risk of not being recognized for what He really was. We have no problem recognizing Christ in church. But when we meet him out on the streets, where He is sometimes sunk in poverty and sorrow, we are reluctant even to bid Him the time of day. Nelson Mandela was still a young man when he became leader of the banned African National Congress (ANC). At a certain stage in the struggle, he was forced to go underground. During that time, he used many different disguises. In general, he remained as unkempt as possible. He knew that by being so disguised he ran the risk of not being recognized even by his own. And this often happened. Once he was to attend a meeting in a distant part of Johannesburg. A priest had arranged with friends of his to put him up for the night. However, when Mandela arrived at the house, the elderly lady who answered the doorbell took one look at him and exclaimed, "We don't want your kind here!" and she shut the door in his face. Later when she found out who it was that she had turned away she was horrified and said to him, "If only I knew it was you, I'd have given you the best room in the house." Thankfully, Mandela didn't allow incidents like this to deter him from fulfilling his mission. Despite his many disguises, there were friends who still managed to recognize him. For instance, one day he was posing as a chauffeur in Johannesburg. Wearing a long dustcoat and cap, he was waiting on a corner to be picked up when he saw an African policeman striding

deliberately towards him. He looked around to see if he had a place to run, but then the policeman smiled at him, surreptitiously gave him the thumbs-up ANC salute, and was gone. Incidents like this happened many times, and Mandela was reassured to know that he had the loyalty of many Africans.

We could say that Jesus too goes about in many different disguises. How then are his friends to recognize him? It is comparatively easy. He always poses as a person in need — in need either of food, or drink, or lodgings, or welcome, or a visit. "If only I had known it was you," said the woman to Mandela. We hear the same words in today's Gospel: "Lord, if only we had known it was You, we'd never have treated You like that. But we thought it was only some common person who was not worthy of our help." But Jesus said that His disciples would be judged precisely by their response to such people — the poor, the lowly, the unimportant. It's easy to be kind to the important — there is or will be a return in some shape or form. But it's quite another matter to be kind to those from whom we can expect nothing in return, perhaps not even thanks.

In the judgement scene, people are condemned, not for sins of commission but for sins of omission. We may think we are good simply because we don't do any harm to anyone. But what about the good we fail to do? The sin of omission is one of the worst sins in the world. From a Christian point of view, there is only one real failure in life — failure to love. We must concentrate on doing good, rather than on merely avoiding evil. Let us not wait for big opportunities. Let us avail of the little opportunities that come our way every day — opportunities to be friendly, to be helpful, to be considerate, to be obliging. Thus, we may be spared the ache of loneliness and sadness which good people often experience late in life at the realization of having left undone what they ought to have done.

When Vince Lombardi, the eminently successful professional football coach in the 1960s, was asked how he produced winning teams, he declared that any group of naturally endowed athletes could win more games than they lost if they concentrated on the "little things" of the game — the fundamentals. After a close game won by his Green Bay Packers, Lombardi called a special session for Monday morning because he felt his players were losing sight of the small details that guarantee victory. Appearing before his players, he held a football above his head and announced, "Men, we need to review the basics of the game. This is a football." Max McGee, so the story goes, drawled, "That's a little fast, coach. Go over that again."

In the Gospel passage this morning, Jesus has gathered His team – his disciples — around Him for one of the last teaching sessions of His career. Throughout His ministry He attempted to help His followers understand the meaning of the "kingdom of God"—what it is, who is in it, what is expected of people who are a part of it. He takes this occasion once again to clarify what it means to be a part of God's kingdom. He returns to fundamentals, and in the process, He helps us understand how the game of life is to be played. I think what Jesus is sharing with us is not a formula for how we save ourselves by our good works, but rather a description of how people who have pledged allegiance to Christ live out that allegiance. Acts of caring and compassion toward the least and loneliest demonstrate that a person is a citizen of the kingdom, even when they don't realize what an impact their actions have. As we are involved in these little acts of kindness, we are helping to make the kingdom of God more visible. One day, we too will be surprised to discover whose life we have impacted with simple acts of kindness.

In the story, Jesus, is telling us about small things. "I was hungry, and you gave me food," the king says to those on his right. For most of us, our opportunity to please God will not be the result of some benevolent act that impacts all of humankind. It will be a small act of caring directed toward an individual we meet along the way in our lives. Amen






We sincerely hope that our families will attend Mass and participate from the pews every week, not only on Family Mass Sundays. Your friends are invited, too!
