

Second Sunday of Lent: THE TRANSFIGURATION: Mark 9:2-10

On this Second Sunday of Lent, we are presented with a profound and transformative passage from the Gospel of Mark, in which we witness the extraordinary event known as the Transfiguration, where Jesus takes Peter, James, and John up a high mountain and is transfigured before them, his clothes becoming dazzling white.

Two mountains dominate our readings today: Mt. Moriah, the place where Abraham's faith was tested, and another mountain, which was most likely Mt. Tabor, where Jesus was transfigured. I think these two mountains symbolize the ups and downs of every life. We have those times when our faith is tested, moments when we think God is demanding too much of us, moments when it seems God is asking us to give up all the blessings He had previously given us. And we have high moments, moments when God seems so close, when His presence fills us with wonder and awe, moments of blessing that we do not want to see come to an end. Often we have no control over where God might put us at different times in our lives: whether we find ourselves on Mt. Moriah facing great trials, or we find ourselves on Mt. Tabor in a state of ecstasy. But for most of us, much of the time we're somewhere in between, plugging along every day.

Difficult times often seem to last forever but they seldom do. Abraham's time of trial ended when God said "hold off, you don't have to sacrifice your son. I just want to know you were willing to obey me." Sometimes that's all God wants from us is for us to say "Thy will be done." Conversely, the joyful moments in our lives end all too quickly. The apostles wanted to stay on Mt. Tabor forever, but our Lord said it was time to go back down. There was a lot of work and very hard times ahead of Him.

Not mentioned is a third very important mountain. It is foreshadowed in the story of Abraham and Isaac. God did not demand the human sacrifice of Isaac, but God's only Son was to remain faithful to His mission even at the cost of His life on the hill of Calvary. Calvary also casts its shadow over the glory of Mt.Tabor. St. Mark makes an obvious connection between Jesus' passion and death and His transfiguration on Mt. Tabor. Mark tells us specifically the transfiguration took place six days after Jesus' first prediction of His passion and death. And Mark ends his narration of the transfiguration with Jesus telling Peter, James, and John not to tell anyone of the vision until He had risen from the dead. The obvious linking of Jesus' death and resurrection with the transfiguration tells us that, while Calvary reminds us of Jesus' suffering and His cross, it is also His hour of glory that brings us salvation, hope and peace.

The Transfiguration is a powerful reminder of the identity and mission of Jesus Christ. It confirms His divine nature

and foreshadows His ultimate victory over sin and death. It is a moment of encouragement for the disciples, strengthening their faith and preparing them for the challenges that lie ahead. But the Transfiguration is not just a historical event that took place on a mountain long ago. It is also a symbol of the transformation that is possible for each one of us. Just as Jesus was transfigured before the eyes of His disciples, so too are we called to be transfigured in Christ. We are called to be transformed by the renewing of our minds, to be conformed to the image of Christ, and to shine with the light of his love and truth. During this season of Lent, as we journey towards the celebration of Easter, let us reflect on the Transfiguration and what it means for our own lives. Like Peter, James, and John, may we be open to the presence of God in our midst, willing to climb the mountain of prayer and contemplation, and ready to encounter the glory of Christ.

The Transfiguration also reminds us of the importance of listening to the voice of God. As the disciples were overshadowed by a cloud and heard the voice of the Father saying, "This is my beloved Son, listen to Him," so too are we called to listen to the voice of Jesus in our lives. In the busyness and noise of the world, may we make time to be still, to listen to His words of love and truth, and to follow Him with all our hearts.

Abraham too obeys the Voice of God in the first reading this weekend. He takes his only son Isaac up to the land of Moriah, builds an altar, and prepares to slaughter his son. Yet, a messenger of the Lord cries out at the last moment to stop him, "Do not lay your hand on the boy... I know now how devoted you are to God since you did not withhold from me your own beloved son." Because of Abraham's faithfulness and surrender to the Lord, the Lord blesses him: "I will bless you abundantly and make your descendants as countless as the stars of the sky."

We can only imagine how Abraham felt, offering the life of his son, not understanding why, but blindly obeying. Yet Abraham's response of total surrender to God's plan is a beautiful testament to trust in God's deep love for us. As Christian stewards, we are called to surrender all to the Lord — our time, our talents, and even our material possessions. We should willingly give God our entire lives with the confidence that He will take care of us. When we surrender all to the Lord, we are allowing Him to be in charge. And just as we see in Abraham's story, when God is in control, He blesses abundantly. Our God is all good, all-knowing, and all-loving. All that He has in store for us is for the good of our salvation. He will not disappoint.

Let us strive to journey up the mountain with Jesus during this Lenten season — growing in our intimate relationship with Him. May we reflect on His profound love for us on this journey. And let us pray for total surrender to His providence. Amen.



The answer to these three questions is, "It's Lent."

The Lenten season decorations are more than just some purple banners. The environment during Lent is designed to help us notice what is important, what is essential. This is done by using minimal decorations. It's stripping away so that we can focus on the essentials. Think of this as a visual de-cluttering. This way we can focus on the readings, the Eucharist, the prayers.

The plants are removed, as is the Holy Water. This gives us a sense of want. How many times will you reach for the Holy Water to bless yourself as you go in and out of the church this season? We notice what is missing. We yearn to fill the gap.

One item that has been added is a symbol of the Gospel reading. Each week during Lent, a new symbol will be put up in front of the ambo. For example, did you notice the small container of ashes on Ash Wednesday? On the first Sunday of Lent, a glass container of sand and several rocks were displayed to depict the desert. What will come next?

We hope that this environment will help your Lenten journey be more fulfilling and meaningful.




Dear All Souls Parishioners,
