

PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION: Is 50:4-7; Phil 2:6-11; Mk 14:1-15:47

Today we celebrate Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week. Our liturgy starts with the account of Jesus humbly entering Jerusalem riding a donkey. People put cloaks and palm branches in His pathway crying, "Hosanna, blessed

is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" It is with great joy that Christ was honored as King; still in the same breath, we are filled with sorrow as we reflect on Christ's passion and death. Thankfully, we know the glorious outcome of this painful journey. Today, as we read about the climax of Christ's mission here on earth, we are reminded that He is the Perfect Steward, a model for us all on our stewardship journey.

The Missal instructs us that today the homily should be brief. If there were any moment of earthly glory for Jesus, His triumphal entry into Jerusalem with people spreading garments and branches in His path was that moment of glory. The people called to Him "Hosanna" (which means "save us"), and they recognized that He was coming as Son of David to establish the reign of God. Jesus knew their enthusiasm would be short-lived. He said in John (3:19) "the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light." Three times He predicted His suffering and death. Even though people can turn away from His light, Jesus' light can never be extinguished. It continues to shine for those who welcome it.

Today's first reading, from the prophet Isaiah, portrays a suffering servant. The suffering servant, in many ways, foreshadows what Jesus endured during His passion — "I gave my back to those who beat me... my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting." Christ endured such tortures, knowing that He did not deserve them, but still He humbly submitted to them. We see that throughout

Second Reading: He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him. (Phil 2:8-9) **Gospel:** They brought him to the place of Golgotha which is translated Place of the Skull—. (Mk 15:22)

Christ's life. His mission as a steward was to fulfill His Father's mission. He became man for a reason, and He humbly and obediently submitted to that mission for each one of us. We, too, play a unique role in our Father's mission by bringing souls to Christ. And it simply begins with the witness of our lives. Let all that we do, including the way we speak and act, reflect our mission in this life.

Our Gospel today shares the account of Jesus' last days on earth, and how He lives them says a great deal about how we should be living ours as faithful stewards. Jesus does

many things in these last days, and they all revolve around prayer and service — two trademark actions of a good and faithful Catholic. He first hosts a Passover meal in which He gives us His Body and Blood in the Eucharist. He then intensely prays to His Father. Lastly, He submits to humiliation, torture, and death for our sake, calling out to God the Father in His weakest moments. We might not

be called to the same type of prayer and service, but we are all called to commit time in daily prayer with our Lord, and to serve our families, churches and neighbors in the various ways God is calling us to do so. No matter our state in life, we are all called to be faithful stewards through prayer and service.

As we embark on this Holy Week, let us take some time to reflect on the life of Christ as He is our model Steward, and we should strive to imitate Him daily. All through Holy Week, we reflect on the mystery of suffering, Jesus 'suffering and our own. It's not a problem to solve but a mystery we must live with. Especially at Mass today and indeed at every Mass, we recall what Jesus did for us. We do, in His memory, what He commanded us. We are assured that in His sufferings He was there before us, He knows what it's like, and He will walk with us through bad times and pull us through. Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again. Amen.



You are Onvited to Holy Week at All Souls Catholic Parish

Palm Sunday, March 24

• We begin Holy Week by celebrating Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, where a large crowd gathered and laid palm branches across His path, welcoming Him as Savior and King. Palms will be distributed at all weekend Masses: Saturday at 4:00 p.m. and Sunday at 8:30 & 10:30 a.m.

Holy Thursday, March 28

 Holy Thursday is the commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, when He established the sacrament of Holy Communion prior to His arrest and crucifixion. It also commemorates His institution of the priesthood. Holy Thursday Mass will be at 7:00 p.m., with Eucharistic Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament at St. Ann continuing until Midnight, where we are invited to spend time in the presence of the Eucharist just as the Disciples kept a vigil with Christ.

Good Friday, March 29

- The events of Good Friday are observed in the 14-step Community Way of the Cross that will be presented on a walk down Ridge Road in Lansing, beginning at Noon at St. Ann and culminating at Trinity Lutheran Church. Many of us have been attending Stations of the Cross every Friday during Lent, but this live Way of the Cross is a completely different experience—bring the whole family and invite your friends! Additionally, the traditional Stations of the Cross will be presented in Church at St. Ann at 7:00 p.m.
- On Good Friday, we will commemorate the Crucifixion of Jesus Christ at 3:00 p.m. at St. Ann with a service that includes the Veneration of the Cross. Traditionally, there is no Mass and no celebration of the Eucharist. Church bells are silent. Altars are left bare. The solemn, muted atmosphere is preserved until the Easter Vigil.

Holy Saturday, March 30

- Bring your Easter baskets and the food that will be prepared for your Easter meal to this special blessing that will be held at 1:00 p.m. in the St. Ann Chapel.
- The Easter Vigil in the Holy Night will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Easter Sunday, March 31

Come celebrate Jesus' triumphant resurrection from the dead at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. Masses on Easter Sunday morning.



All are invited to bring bells to Church during the Triduum to be rung on both Holy Thursday and Holy Saturday during the singing of the Gloria.



QUESTION:

Where did the feast of Divine Mercy come from?

ANSWER:

If you were born well before the year 2000, you know the feast of Divine Mercy has not always been celebrated in the Church. In the early 1900s, a young Polish nun began receiving private revelations. Jesus appeared to her during her times of prayer, speaking a message of mercy and love for the world. She received a set of prayers — the Divine Mercy Chaplet — and the request to have a feast day established to remind the Church of the mercy of God. St. Faustina died in 1938, on the cusp of war and in the midst of one of the most violent centuries in the history of the world.

Her story and her diaries began circulating in Poland and beyond. It quickly became apparent that this was a holy young women, and the cause for her canonization opened. In the year 2000, she was canonized by the first-ever Polish pope, St. John Paul II. On her canonization day, he established the second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday, "a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind with experience in the years to come." LPi

The world is in need of God's mercy to help us endure the hardships and uncertainty of life as we journey toward our eternal home. Join us on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 7, at 3:00 p.m. as we adore God and ask for His mercy. Benediction, Rosary, Divine Mercy Chaplet, and Psalms will be included in our worship.
