

OUR VISION


All Souls Catholic Parish aspires to be an inviting faith community where members and newcomers alike are engaged, inspired, and spiritually nourished among friends that become family.

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

The Temptations of Jesus: Not On Bread Alone

Lent is the season in our liturgical year when the Church encourages us to increase our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving to enter more deeply into the mystery of our Lord's Passion and Death and celebrate His Resurrection more fully. Our outlook as Christian stewards can help us embrace this season with enthusiasm and even joy.

This first Sunday of Lent reminds us that we embark on a sacred journey that mirrors the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness. This period is a time for reflection, repentance, and renewal. Our readings this weekend provide us with profound insights into the nature of faith, trust, and the steadfast love of God.

In our first reading (Deuteronomy 26:4-10), we witness a powerful act of remembrance and gratitude. Having been delivered from the bondage of Egypt, the Israelites are instructed to present the first fruits of their harvest to the Lord. This act is not merely a ritual but a profound expression of thanksgiving and acknowledgment of God's saving power and providence. It reminds us that our lives and all we possess are gifts from God. In this Lenten season, let us cultivate a heart of gratitude, recognizing God's presence and blessings in our lives and offering back to Him the fruits of our labor, our time, and our talents. As grateful stewards ourselves, we can look at these 40 days as "soil" that God is giving us as a gift to grow closer to Him and become more like Him. We can choose to use each of these days intentionally to make a generous response to our God, who sent His own Son to deliver us from the affliction and oppression caused by sin.

In the second reading (Romans 10:8-13), St. Paul speaks to the heart of our faith: the word is near us, on our lips, and in our hearts. He emphasizes that salvation is accessible to all who confess with their lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in their hearts that God raised Him from the dead. This passage is a call to authentic faith—a faith that is not just intellectual assent but a deep, personal trust in Jesus Christ as our Savior. During Lent, we are invited to deepen this faith, to allow it to transform our lives, and to share it boldly with others. Let us remember that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved, and let this assurance fill us with hope and courage.

The Gospel reading (Luke 4:1-13) takes us into the wilderness with Jesus, where He faces temptation from the devil. This passage is rich with meaning and offers us a model for our own spiritual battles. Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, confronts the tempter with the truth of God's Word. Each temptation—whether it be turning stones into bread, gaining worldly power, or testing God's protection—is met with a firm reliance on Scripture and a deep trust in God's plan.

In our own lives, we too face temptations that challenge our faith and integrity. Jesus' example teaches us the importance of grounding ourselves in God's Word and relying on the Holy Spirit for strength. As we journey through Lent, let us

take time to immerse ourselves in Scripture, allowing it to guide us and fortify us against the trials we encounter. While our Lord was strong enough to withstand the temptations of the devil on His own, we most certainly are not! We must turn to the Holy Spirit and ask Him to show us where we need to grow internally and then rely on the Holy Spirit for strength and guidance throughout these 40 days of growth.

A human being doesn't live on bread alone. Bread is one of the basic staples of bodily life. To nourish a human person is not the same as to fatten cattle. Our bodies need food. But so do our souls crave nourishment. The story of Elvis Presley powerfully illustrates the truth of this. Elvis became very rich. He owned eight cars, six motorbikes, two planes, 16 television sets, a vast mansion, and several bulging bank accounts. On top of that, he was idolized by legions of fans. Yet he wasn't happy. Amid all his wealth and success, he experienced spiritual malaise and complained of loneliness and boredom. By age 22, he found that there were no more worlds to conquer. This malaise could have been an opportunity. It was a stark reminder that "man doesn't live on bread alone"—that is on solely material things.

This message rings out loud and clear in today's Gospel. It is a vital message and is perhaps more relevant today than ever. We don't live on bread alone—at least not if we want to be fully alive and fully nourished as human beings and children of God. What else do we need? What else do we hunger for? We need the word of God.

Imagine parents who feed their child but never speak a word to him or her. No guidance, no encouragement, no affirmation, no consolation. Never a word to communicate peace and welcome, or love and joy. The child's body would be nourished, but its heart and soul would be empty. We are God's children. We need to hear God's word. Bread alone won't always guarantee even physical survival. It's not just the human body that gets hungry. The human heart and the human spirit get hungry, too. Until we acknowledge and address the hunger of the heart and the spirit, we will always be undernourished.

Jesus challenges us to address our deeper hungers and greater needs. What does the heart really hunger for? It's certainly not bread. It hungers for the food that doesn't perish—the Word of God. The Word of God has the power to nourish us with the bread of meaning, the bread of hope, and above all, the bread of love.

Dear friends, Lent is a time to return to the Lord with all our hearts. It is a season of grace, inviting us to renew our commitment to God and to live out our faith with sincerity and love. Let us embrace this sacred time with open hearts, seeking to grow closer to God and to one another. May our journey through the wilderness lead us to the joy of Easter, where we will celebrate the victory of life over death and the triumph of love over sin.

Let us pray for the grace to walk this Lenten path with courage and faith, trusting in the Lord, who is always near, ready to guide us and sustain us on our journey. Amen.



Franciscan Father Ed Shea is the third of eight children from St. Giles Parish in Oak Park. A 1974 graduate of Fenwick High School and a 1978 graduate of the University of Notre Dame, Father Shea joined the Franciscans in 1980 and was ordained a priest in 1987. Father Ed has spent most of his priesthood in parish work, including four years as the priest-president for the St. Giles Family Mass Community in Oak Park, IL, and five years as the pastor of St. John the Baptist Catholic Church in Joliet, IL. For six years he was pastor of St. Joseph Parish, a predominantly His-

panic community in Chicago's famous Back of the Yards neighborhood. Father Ed has served on his Provincial Council and as Director of Vocations and Formation for the Franciscans in the Midwest. Father Ed has also preached internationally — in Mexico and Central America and even in Tanzania, Africa. After 12 years at St. Peter's in downtown Chicago, Father Ed has moved to a new Franciscan Inner City Mission in the Diocese of Gary, Indiana, where he continues to be involved in bilingual ministry in the Gary/Chicago area and beyond. A Franciscan priest who loves to sing and tell stories, more than anything he thrives on celebrating the sacraments of the Church. A true follower of St. Francis, Father Ed finds reasons to rejoice often in the goodness of God's presence in our world.




