

TRIUMPH OF THE CROSS





THE FEAST OF THE EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

This weekend, as we celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, the Church invites us to contemplate the mystery of the Cross—not as a symbol of defeat or shame, but as the very instrument of our salvation and the greatest sign of God’s love for humanity. The readings for this feast guide us into the heart of this mystery, revealing the Cross as the axis of salvation history and the path to true life.

The first reading (Numbers 21:4b-9) recounts the journey of the Israelites in the desert. In their impatience and suffering, they complain against God and Moses, and consequently, they are afflicted by serpents. Yet, when they repent, God instructs Moses to make a bronze serpent and mount it on a pole; whoever looks at it is healed and lives. This episode is more than a story of physical healing—it is a prophetic sign pointing to Christ. The bronze serpent, lifted up for the people to see, becomes a symbol of salvation: by looking with faith, the Israelites are saved from death.

St. Paul’s hymn to Christ in the letter to the Philippians (2:6-11) reveals the inner logic of the Cross. Jesus, though equal with God, “emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness... He humbled Himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross.” Because of this radical humility and obedience, “God greatly exalted Him and bestowed on Him the name that is above every name.” The Cross, therefore, is not merely a point of suffering, but the path to glory. In Christ’s self-emptying, we see the model of true greatness: not grasping at power but giving oneself in love.

In the Gospel (John 3:13-17), Jesus himself interprets the meaning of the Cross: “Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in Him may have eternal life.” Here, the Cross is revealed as the moment of supreme love—“For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him might not perish but might have eternal life.” The Cross is not an accident or a tragedy, but the fulfillment of God’s saving plan. It is the place where divine mercy meets human sin, and where death is conquered by love.

The Cross, once an instrument of torture, has become for us a source of life, pardon, and peace. As Pope Benedict XVI reflected, “He who possesses [the Cross] possesses a treasure.” The Church lifts high the Cross so that all may see the extent of Christ’s love. We are called not only to venerate the Cross, but to embrace it in our own lives: to unite our sufferings, our sacrifices, and our daily struggles to the Cross of Christ, trusting that through them, God’s love is made manifest in the world.

The Cross stands at the center of our faith. It is our only hope and the sign by which we are redeemed. As we gaze upon the Cross today, let us remember that it is not just a relic of the past, but a living reality. The Crucified and Ris-

en Lord invites us to follow Him along the way of the Cross, promising that those who lose their life for His sake will find it.

What does this feast mean to you and me:

It is a Sign of Christ’s Triumph and Our Redemption. The Cross is not merely a reminder of Christ’s suffering, but a powerful sign of His triumph. By His death and resurrection, Jesus transformed the Cross into a source of salvation, demonstrating God’s power to bring good out of evil and life out of death. For us, this means that no suffering or hardship is meaningless when united to Christ; every trial can be transformed by His love.

It is a Call to Embrace Our Own Crosses. This feast invites us to reflect on our own struggles and challenges. Just as Jesus embraced His Cross, we are called to take up our own crosses—our difficulties, sacrifices, and pains—and offer them to God. In doing so, we participate in Christ’s redemptive work, trusting that He can transform even our greatest burdens into sources of grace.

It is a Source of Strength and Hope in Our Daily Lives. In our world marked by adversity and uncertainty, the Cross stands as a beacon of hope. The feast reassures us that God’s love is stronger than any suffering, and that Christ’s victory is our victory. The Cross becomes our guide, giving us courage to face challenges with faith and resilience.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross is also a reminder that Christ’s sacrifice is for all people, for all times. The Cross is the new “Tree of Life,” nourishing all who seek redemption in Christ. The feast invites us to see the world and our own lives through the light of the Cross, recognizing the universality of God’s saving love.

Finally, let us ask ourselves individually what we can do to live this feat in our personal lives:

- Contemplate the Cross: Spend time in prayer, reflecting on the love and mercy poured out through Christ’s sacrifice. How about stopping by the Blessed Sacrament this week or next for Adoration and to listen to Him. Our Church is open Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. and on Mondays and Thursdays, the blessed Sacrament is exposed all day.
- Embrace suffering with Faith: Offer your struggles to God, trusting in His power to transform them.
- Proclaim Hope: Let the Cross inspire you to bring hope and compassion to others, especially those who suffer.
- Rejoice in Redemption: Celebrate the victory of Christ and the new life He offers through the Cross.

In summary, the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is a profound invitation to recognize the Cross as the ultimate sign of God’s love, hope, and victory, and to let its mystery shape our lives each day. Amen.



ONE MORE TIME!

As you may be aware, St. Ann Parish has carried a loan for the church building ever since its initial construction in 1996. When St. Ann, St. James, and St. John merged to form All Souls, the Archdiocese of Chicago graciously forgave the existing debt incurred from assessment defaults. But the Archdiocese Assessment was the only debt covered under the Renew My Church Forgiveness Agreement. The capital debt—that is, the debt incurred from the diocese lending the parish funds to build the Church—was not included in the RMC Agreement. Over the years, that capital debt has accrued interest, leaving us with a substantial financial obligation of \$4,298,612.47. Yes, you read that right—over four million dollars!



For several years, we've been working closely with the Archdiocese of Chicago to seek relief from this capital debt—our only viable path forward. After numerous meetings, Zoom calls, and conversations, we're thrilled to share that an agreement has finally been reached. The parish has committed to paying \$350,000 toward the principal, and in turn, the Archdiocese of Chicago has written off the remaining capital debt.

As of the new fiscal year 2025-2026, All Souls Parish carries zero debt related to the church building—a major milestone in our journey! This kind of financial milestone doesn't just lift a burden—it opens doors for future ministry, outreach, and growth.

Thank you for your continued support and prayers—let us go rejoicing!


