


All Souls Catholic Parish aspires to be an inviting faith community where members and newcomers alike are engaged, inspired, and spiritually nourished among friends that become family.

THIRTIETH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME: The Pharisee and The Tax Collector

In the past few reflections, we have mentioned the four main pillars of parish stewardship—Hospitality, Prayer, Formation, and Service—are the foundation of building a vibrant, faith-filled community. Each pillar represents a dimension of discipleship and parish life, and together they create a culture of stewardship. In last week's readings, we were encouraged to remain persistent and constant in our prayer life. Today, we focus on the proper attitude of a steward at prayer.

One of the wonderful aspects of stewardship spirituality is its balanced approach to all areas of life. We see this balance in play this week as we continue to explore the Pillar of Prayer. As stewards, aware of our total dependence on God for everything, we come to Him in awe and gratitude. At the same time, we approach God with an awareness of the great dignity He has given us, creating us in His own image and likeness and calling us to join Him in the work of advancing His kingdom.

The readings for the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time form a profound reflection on humility, justice, and the true posture of the heart before God. They call us to examine how we pray, how we serve, and how we understand our relationship with God and others.

The first reading (Sirach 35:12–14, 16–18) reminds us that God is impartial. He does not show favoritism toward the rich or powerful. Instead, He listens attentively to the cry of the poor, the orphan, and the widow. The text declares that, "The prayer of the humble pierces the clouds." This is not simply a poetic image, it is a theological truth. God's justice is rooted in His mercy. He is not swayed by appearances or status but by sincerity of heart. The humble person, who recognizes their dependence on God, finds favor in His sight. In our world, where power and prestige often dictate worth, this passage is a radical reminder that God's measure of greatness is humility. The one who kneels in truth before Him stands tallest in His kingdom.

In the second reading (2 Timothy 4:6–8, 16–18), Saint Paul speaks with the serene confidence of a man who has fought the good fight. He knows his life is nearing its end, yet his words are not of despair but of triumph: "I have finished the race; I have kept the faith." Paul's faithfulness was not without suffering—he faced abandonment, trials, and persecution. Yet he declares that "the Lord stood by me and gave me strength." His steadfastness is not born of pride but of humble reliance on God's grace. The crown of righteousness he awaits is not a personal trophy but a gift from the Lord, "the just judge," who rewards those who long for His appearing. Paul's example teaches us that humility and perseverance go hand in hand. The humble heart does not seek recognition but remains faithful in service, trusting that God's justice will prevail, even when human justice fails.

In the Gospel (Luke 18:9–14), Jesus tells a parable that perfectly embodies the message of the other readings. Two men go up to the Temple to pray: a Pharisee and a Tax Collector. The Pharisee's prayer is self-congratulatory. He recounts his virtues, comparing himself favorably to others. His words are directed not toward God but toward himself. He prays from a position of spiritual pride, believing his righteousness earns him divine ap-

proval. The Tax Collector, on the other hand, stands at a distance, unable even to lift his eyes to heaven. He simply says, "O God, be merciful to me, a sinner." His prayer is short, honest, and humble. Jesus concludes that it is the tax collector—not the Pharisee—who goes home justified. This parable overturns human expectations. It reveals that true righteousness is not self-made but God-given. The humble sinner who acknowledges his need for mercy is closer to God than the proud religious man who trusts in his own virtue.

This week we are invited us to look inward and ask ourselves what is the posture of my heart before God? In our prayer, we are invited to imitate the tax collector—to come before God with honesty, not performance. In our service, we are called to imitate Paul—to persevere in faith even when unrecognized. And in our relationships, we are urged to reflect God's impartial love—to see others not through the lens of judgment but with compassion. If we stand before Him in humility, acknowledging our weakness, we open ourselves to His transforming grace. The humble prayer pierces the clouds because it rises from truth. And in that truth, we find freedom, mercy, and the joy of being justified—not by our own deeds, but by the boundless love of God.

We can learn from both of those gospel characters. There is a Pharisee lurking in each of us. Like him we may be very conscious of the sins of others but blind to our own. It's easy to get into the habit of confessing the sins of others. But this is dangerous because it prevents us from looking at our own sins. Besides, it's impossible to weigh the sins of others without putting our own finger on the scales. On the other hand, the Tax Collector shows us how to confess our sins. Even though we may not be conscious of any specific sins, each of us can still say in all truth, "I am a sinner."

Many people approach the Sacrament of Reconciliation with a prepared list of sins. Most of the things that appear on that list are trivial matters and don't worry much from one Confession to the next. No attempt is made to get down to the roots of their relationship with God and other people. Too much emphasis is placed on the sins, not enough on the fact of being a sinner. It would have been easy for the Tax Collector to produce a list of sins. But he didn't do this; he did something better, and harder. He said, "I am a sinful man." We too must be prepared to stand before God as sinners, as much in need of God's mercy as the ground is in need of rain. What we must face is not the fact that we commit sins, but that we are sinners. We are sinful, fallen people, that is the reality. Sin is not just an act or series of acts, but a condition in which we live. This is the great truth which the Tax-Collector grasped.

A great problem of our time is man's failure to know himself, to recognize evil and deal with it within himself. People in support groups say that the turning point for them is when they can name their weakness. The Pharisee was full of himself, the center of his own world. He had exalted himself. From that exalted position he looked down on others, some of whom he despised. The Tax Collector, on the other hand, humbled himself before God. He placed his hope in the mercy of God. We would do well to do the same. God prefers the broken and contrite heart that knows its failures over the complacent and arrogant one that claims never to have sinned. "Better a sinner who knows he's a sinner than a saint who knows he's a saint." (Yiddish saying)



SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 1, 7:00 p.m.


The Feast of All Souls is one way of celebrating those who rest in God's loving embrace and remain within our hearts and minds. It is a special way to remember them in the light of our all-loving God. We will celebrate them at a special Mass on November 1.

As an act of honor and tribute, we invite you to bring framed photos of the cherished people you have lost to the Parish Office M-F, 8:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. These can include all deceased loved ones, regardless of when they passed away. These will remain on display on our Table of Remembrance in Church during the whole month of November and prayed over at the November 1 All Souls' Day Mass. *(Please write your name and phone on the photo so we may return it to you.)* You are also invited to print the names of the deceased in our Book of the Dead located on the podium at the back of church.

If you have a family member who passed away on or after November 2, 2024 and was NOT buried through All Souls Parish/St. Ann Church, please call the parish office with the name(s) of the deceased no later than October 27. Their names will be read at the All Souls Day Mass. If your loved one was buried through us, you need not call as we will have his/her name in our records.
