

PRESENTATION OF THE LORD





**THE FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:
The Beatitudes**

A wealthy man who rarely went to church was on his deathbed and sent for the pastor. "Pastor," he said, "you know I've never cared much for church matters but I'm about to die, and I want to be sure of my eternal salvation. Do you suppose that if I gave \$1 million to the church, and \$100,000 to you personally, I would go to heaven?" The pastor thought about that idea for a second or two and then replied, "Well, sir, I can't say for sure, but what do you have to lose?"

Our Lord expects more from us. Today we begin the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus begins to lay out what He does expect of us. The Sermon on the Mount is the first of five major sections of St. Matthew's Gospel dedicated to Jesus' teachings. It is not necessarily a sermon Jesus preached from beginning to end. It is made up of many things Jesus taught on other occasions, which Matthew, as the writer of the Gospel, chose to put together in this form as one sermon. I want to stress this is one of five sections Matthew gives us of Jesus' teaching; thus, this one sermon is not everything Jesus taught. Matthew makes a point of Jesus preaching on a mountain. He seeks to present Jesus as a new Moses, who proclaimed God's law to God's people on a mountain.

The Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time places us at the beginning of Jesus' public teaching and at the heart of the Gospel's values. Through the prophet Zephaniah, Saint Paul's letter to the Corinthians, and the opening of the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew, we are invited to see how God consistently chooses what is humble, poor, and seemingly insignificant to reveal true strength, wisdom, and holiness. Together, these readings challenge our assumptions about success and show us what life in God's Kingdom truly looks like.

In the first reading (Zep 2:3; 3:12-13), Zephaniah speaks to a people marked by judgment and loss, yet his message is hope, not despair. He calls the people to "seek the Lord," especially those who are humble and lowly. God promises to leave behind a remnant, not the powerful or self-sufficient, but those who are poor, meek, and faithful. This remnant will find refuge in the Lord and live without fear or deceit. This reading reveals a foundational biblical truth: God's saving work begins with humility. The poor here are not only economically poor but spiritually dependent people who know they cannot save themselves. Their strength lies not in wealth, armies, or status, but in trust in God. This prepares us for the Gospel, where Jesus will describe exactly who belongs to this humble remnant.

In the second reading (1 Cor 1:26-31), Saint Paul furthers this theme by reminding the Corinthians of who they were when God called them. Not many were wise by human standards. Not many were powerful or noble. Yet God deliberately chose them. Paul explains that God chooses what the world calls foolish to shame the wise, what is weak to shame the strong,

and what is lowly to bring to nothing what is exalted. The reason is clear: so that no one may boast before God. This reading confronts our instinct to measure life by achievement, intelligence, or prestige. In God's economy, everything is gift. Christ himself becomes our wisdom, righteousness, sanctification, and redemption. The message is unsettling but liberating: We do not earn God's love by impressing Him. We receive it by surrendering to Him.

Today's Gospel reading (Mt 5:1-12a) recounts what we know as Christ's Sermon on the Mount. This entire reflection could be devoted to that, of course, but as always, there are also messages that are important in the other readings, as mentioned above. The Sermon on the Mount is the first of five teachings Jesus gives us in the Gospel of Matthew. The Lord gives this relatively early in His Ministry, not long after He has been baptized. In the entire New Testament, this is the longest continuous section of Jesus speaking, and it is perhaps the most widely quoted of part of the four Canonical Gospels. It contains, after all, the central rules of discipleship. In the Catechism of the Catholic Church (# 1716) this idea is supported in the following passage that states, "The Beatitudes are at the heart of Jesus' preaching. They take up the promises made to the chosen people since Abraham. The Beatitudes fulfill the promises by ordering them no longer merely to the possession of a territory, but to the Kingdom of heaven."



Probably every Catholic theologian and cleric has addressed the Beatitudes. On a 2014 Sunday with this same reading in his homily, Pope Francis said, "These are our new commandments. However, if we do not have a heart open to the Holy Spirit, they will seem silly. The thought of being poor, being meek, being merciful does not seem to lead to what we consider to be modern success. But if we do not have an open heart and if we have not experienced the consolation of the Holy Spirit, which is salvation, we cannot understand this. This is the law of freedom, with the freedom of the Holy Spirit."

When we place together all the three readings of this weekend, a unifying message emerges clearly.

- Zephaniah speaks of a humble remnant.
- Paul reminds us that God chooses the lowly.
- Jesus blesses those the world overlooks.
- God's Kingdom belongs to those who know their need for Him.

And finally, these Fourth Sunday readings invite us to stop striving for greatness on the world's terms and to begin living the quiet, demanding, and joyful path of the Beatitudes. This path does not remove suffering, but it fills life with meaning. It does not promise power, but it promises the Kingdom of Heaven. In embracing the Sermon on the Mount, we discover that true blessing is not found in having more, but in trusting more deeply, loving more freely, and walking humbly with our God. Amen.




Our Next Children's Liturgy is Sunday, March 1 at 10:30
