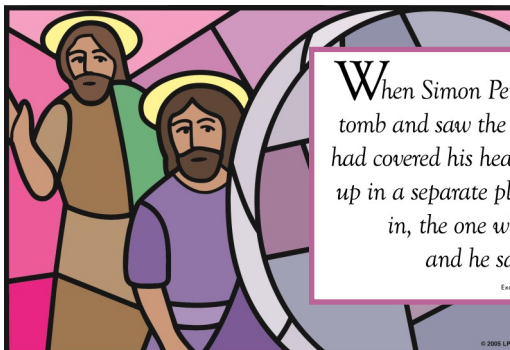

EASTER SUNDAY: The Resurrection of The Lord

Happy Easter to all of you, dear family of faith! The great feast of Easter has begun, Christian stewards. Let us rejoice and be glad! Just as we embraced the discipline and fasting of Lent, let us fully embrace the joy and feasting that the next 50 days offer us until Pentecost Sunday. We are called to be good stewards of the Easter season.

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ stands at the center of Christian faith. Easter proclaims that death does not have the final word, sin does not have the final victory, and darkness cannot overcome the light of God.

The three readings today guide us from the reality of the Resurrection to its meaning for believers, and finally to how we live as people of the Resurrection. How do we ordinary people preach and testify to all God has done? By the way we live our ordinary lives through the intentional use of our time, talent, and treasure for the kingdom of God. Putting God and others ahead of ourselves in every aspect of our lives is the most eloquent preaching we can do. Boldly and joyfully embracing a stewardship way of life is our most powerful testimony.

In the first reading (Acts 10:34a, 37–43), Peter proclaims the core message of Christianity. He speaks about Jesus who “went about doing good and healing those oppressed,” who was killed, but whom God raised on the third day. Peter is not speaking about a myth or an idea. He speaks as a witness. He and the other apostles ate and drank with the risen Jesus. They encountered Him alive. Because of this experience, they boldly preached that Jesus is Lord and that everyone who believes in Him receives forgiveness of sins. This reminds us that Easter is not just a celebration or tradition. It is the proclamation that Jesus truly rose from the dead, and this event changed the course of history. The Resurrection confirms that Jesus is truly the Son of God and that His love is stronger than death.

In the second reading (Colossians 3:1–4), St. Paul tells believers, “If you were raised with Christ, seek what is above.” Through baptism, Christians share in Christ’s death and Resurrection. This means our lives should reflect this new reality. Paul invites us to shift our focus from purely earthly concerns to the values of God’s kingdom not ignoring daily responsibilities, but living with a different perspective. Our priorities change when we remember that our true life is hidden with Christ in God.

A resurrected life is marked by:

- Hope instead of despair
- Love instead of hatred
- Forgiveness instead of revenge

- Faith instead of fear

Easter calls us to live as people who already share in Christ’s victory. The Gospel from John 20:1–9 describes the discovery of the empty tomb. Mary Magdalene goes early in the morning while it is still dark and finds the stone rolled away. Peter and the beloved disciple run to the tomb. They see the burial cloths lying there. At first, the disciples were confused and afraid. But the empty tomb becomes the first sign that something extraordinary has happened. Gradually, they come to believe that Jesus has risen. This moment shows that faith often begins with seeking, questioning, and encountering signs of God’s presence. Just as the disciples moved from confusion to belief, we too are invited to deepen our faith in the risen Lord.

Easter is not only about remembering what happened long ago. It is about allowing the Resurrection to transform our lives today. We can live the Easter message in several concrete ways.



- Living With Hope: The Resurrection assures us that suffering and difficulties do not have the final word. Even in trials, we trust that God can bring new life.
- Choosing Forgiveness: Because Christ conquered sin, we are called to forgive others and seek reconciliation instead of holding onto anger.
- Being Witnesses of Christ: Just as Peter proclaimed the risen Lord, Christians today are called to show Christ through acts of kindness, justice, and compassion.
- Renewing Our Relationship With God: Prayer, Scripture, and the sacraments help us remain connected to the risen Christ.
- Bringing Light Into Darkness: Like Mary Magdalene who went to the tomb while it was still dark, we are called to carry the light of Christ into situations of suffering, loneliness, and injustice.

Easter proclaims a powerful truth: Christ is risen, and His Resurrection changes everything. The tomb is empty, hope is alive, and new life is possible for all who believe. When we live with hope, love others generously, forgive freely, and remain close to Christ, we become living witnesses of the Resurrection in the world. Through our lives, others can see that the risen Lord is still alive and working among His people today.

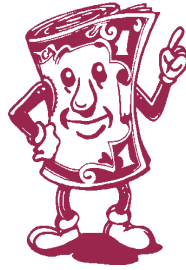

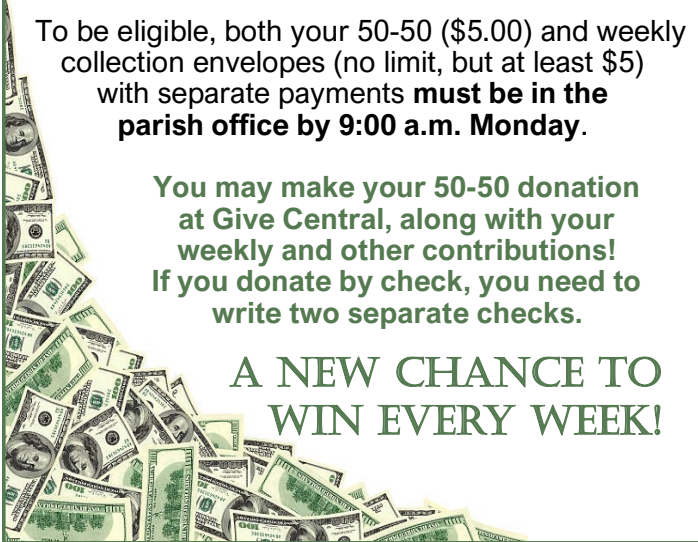

QUESTION:
Where did the feast of Divine Mercy come from?

ANSWER:
If you were born well before the year 2000, you know the feast of Divine Mercy has not always been celebrated in the Church. In the early 1900s, a young Polish nun began receiving private revelations. Jesus appeared to her during her times of prayer, speaking a message of mercy and love for the world. She received a set of prayers — the Divine Mercy Chaplet — and the request to have a feast day established to remind the Church of the mercy of God. St. Faustina died in 1938, on the cusp of war and in the midst of one of the most violent centuries in the history of the world.

Her story and her diaries began circulating in Poland and beyond. It quickly became apparent that this was a holy young woman, and the cause for her canonization opened. In the year 2000, she was canonized by the first-ever Polish pope, St. John Paul II. On her canonization day, he established the second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday, “a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind with experience in the years to come.”

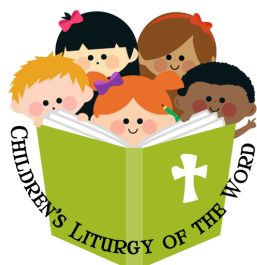

What is EUCHARISTIC ADORATION and why is it important?

- Eucharistic adoration is a way to deepen one's personal relationship with Jesus Christ by spending time in prayer and adoration before the exposed Eucharist.
- It allows for a more intimate experience of Jesus' presence than is possible during Mass.
- It is a source of peace, comfort, and spiritual renewal, and also an opportunity to express love, gratitude, and adoration to Jesus.
- There are no strict rules about what to do during adoration, but it is a time for quiet reflection and prayer. Some might pray the rosary, meditate on scripture, read spiritual books, or simply sit in silence.



The key is to focus on the presence of Jesus and allow oneself to be near Him.

Did you know that we have EUCHARISTIC ADORATION in the St. Ann Day Chapel every Monday and Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.?

This means that twice a week there is a chance for you to spend a few minutes or a few hours with the Eucharist, right here at All Souls! When the Eucharist is exposed, it should not be left unattended. Would you be willing to take an hour-long shift watching over the Eucharist? There is a sign-up sheet in the Narthex, or you may call the office at 708-895-6700. We also sometimes need substitutes for regular attendants if you are available to fill in. Thank you!

Easter 2026

Dear Friends in Christ,

Before the proclamation of the gospel at the Easter Vigil liturgy, there is a deeply powerful and moving moment. It is the joyous triple Alleluia. It not only signals the end of our penitential observances but it expresses our passage with the Lord through his passion, death, and burial. Alleluia is our joyful shout of triumph for as Christ rises from the dead, so do we.

Yet, we may find that our Easter joy has been dampened this year in the face of the daunting challenges of war, the upheavals experienced by migrant families, the great turbulence and polarization in our political life, and the myriad uncertainties about our future and the future of our children. Can we sing Alleluia and mean it?

Experiencing those sentiments myself I am drawn to Saint Paul's words to the Thessalonians. In a moment of suffering loss, confusion and grief he wrote: "But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died." (1Thessalonians 4:13-14)

Listen carefully to Paul's words. He tells the Thessalonians that they can grieve and that they can experience struggle and loss. But they must not grieve or suffer as those who have no hope, as those who do not believe that Jesus died and rose and will take us to himself. Like the Thessalonians, we do not ignore or deny the suffering and grief we are experiencing, but we are not held captive to this moment nor to this world. We hold fast to Christ our hope who draws us into a future defined and shaped by his Resurrection.

So, sisters and brothers, let's not hold back our shouts of joy. Let us sing with gusto our Alleluia for it bears witness to our enduring hope in Christ's Resurrection. It inspires us to do what we can to allow his risen life to take hold of and shape our lives and to empower us to reach out to our wounded world. A blessed Easter to all of you and your loved ones.

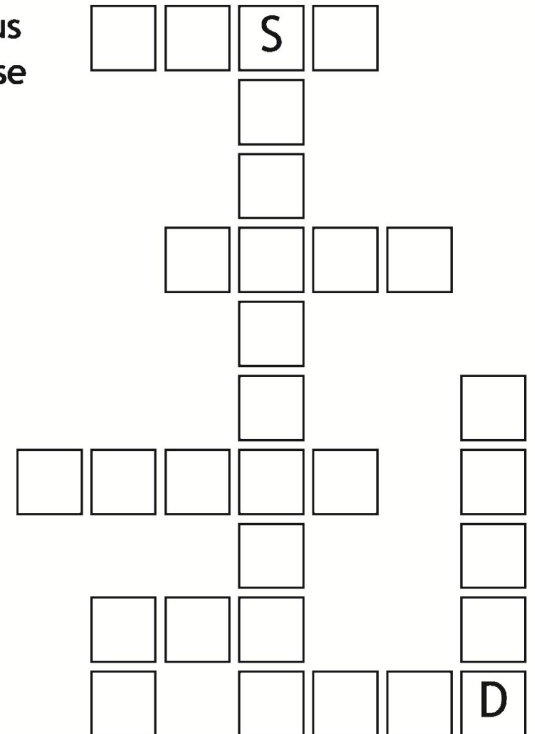

GENERATION TO GENERATION: ANSWER THE CALL CAMPAIGN AT All Souls Parish!

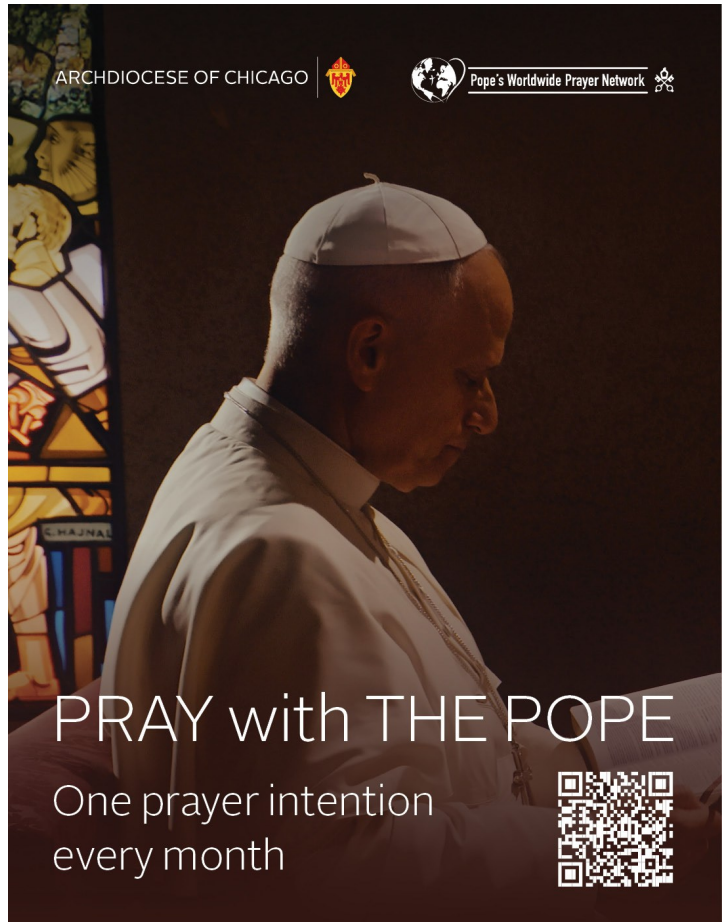

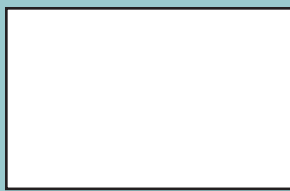

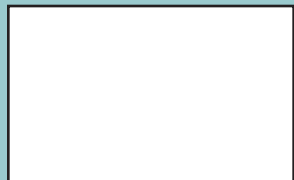
