2ND SUNDAY OF EASTER.





THE SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER: Divine Mercy

The Second Sunday of Easter, also called Divine Mercy Sunday, celebrates the overflowing mercy of the risen Christ. The Christian steward approaches life with an “Easter vision,” rooted in gratitude for and confidence in the salvation our Lord has won for us through His death and Resurrection. Today’s readings show how that vision is lived out in daily life and remind us that we can place complete trust in the mercy of God to lead us, step by step, toward heaven.

All the Sunday readings this weekend show how resurrection transforms fear into faith, isolation into community, and doubt into trust. Together, all three present a clear path for Christian living: remain rooted in the community of faith, live with hope in trials, and trust in the mercy of Christ even when faith is difficult.

The Gospel (John 20:19–31) takes us into a room where the disciples are hiding in fear. The crucifixion has shattered their hopes, and they fear persecution. Yet Jesus enters through the locked doors and greets them with the words, “Peace be with you.” The first gift of the resurrection is peace. Jesus then breathes the Holy Spirit upon them and gives them the authority to forgive sins. This moment reveals the heart of Divine Mercy: God restores what sin has broken.

The Gospel also highlights Thomas, who initially doubts the resurrection. Thomas represents every believer who struggles with faith at times. When Jesus appears again, He does not condemn Thomas. Instead, He invites him to touch His wounds. The wounds of Christ become signs of mercy rather than shame. Thomas responds with one of the most profound professions of faith in the New Testament: “My Lord and my God!” Jesus concludes with a blessing for future believers: “Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.” This blessing is directed toward us.

How can you and I live this Gospel in our daily lives?

- **Let us try to seek Christ’s peace in moments of fear.** When anxiety or uncertainty surrounds us, we turn to prayer and allow Christ’s words, “Peace be with you,” to calm our hearts.
- **Practice forgiveness.** Divine Mercy Sunday reminds us that we must both receive and give mercy. We forgive family members, friends, and colleagues instead of holding resentment.
- **Bring our doubts to Christ.** Faith grows not by pretending certainty but by honestly bringing questions to prayer, scripture, and the community of believers.
- **Trust the mercy revealed in Christ’s wounds.** Our own wounds, failures, and sins are not obstacles to God’s love but places where His mercy can enter.

Our first reading (Acts 2:42–47) describes this beautiful way of life as practiced by the first Christians: “They devoted

themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of the bread and to the prayers.” And, “They ate their meals with exultation and sincerity of heart, praising God and enjoying favor with all the people.” This is a snapshot of the first community of Christian stewards living daily stewardship, embracing prayer through the breaking of the bread, formation through the teaching of the apostles, hospitality through communal life and joyful fellowship, and service through their care for one another. What an inspiration for us as modern-day stewards!

All three readings converge on the theme of Divine Mercy. In the Gospel, Jesus shows mercy to the frightened disciples and a doubting Thomas. In Acts, mercy is lived out in a community that shares everything, so no one suffers alone. In 1 Peter, mercy gives believers hope even in suffering because Christ’s resurrection has opened the path to eternal life.

Divine Mercy is therefore not only a devotion, but a way of life. Living the message of Divine Mercy every day of our lives should be our mission. Christ calls believers to become instruments of mercy in the world.

- Receive mercy through repentance, prayer, and sacraments.
- Show mercy through forgiveness, compassion, and generosity.
- Build community by supporting and encouraging fellow believers.
- Trust God completely, even when faith feels uncertain.

When these attitudes shape daily life, the Church becomes like the community in Acts: joyful, united, and full of grace.

The Second Sunday of Easter invites Christians to move from fear to faith and from doubt to trust. The risen Christ stands among His people today just as He stood among the disciples and said, “Peace be with you.” By living the teachings of the early Church, holding onto hope during trials, and trusting in the mercy revealed in Christ’s wounds, believers become witnesses to the resurrection.

Divine Mercy Sunday ultimately reminds us that no sin, doubt, or suffering is greater than the mercy of God revealed in the risen Lord.

The Easter season is not a time to relax though, in the practice of our faith now that Lent is behind us. Rather, it is a time to live our faith with even deeper joy and gratitude as we celebrate our Lord’s victory over sin and death. St. Peter captures this Easter outlook beautifully in our second reading: “Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who in His great mercy gave us a new birth to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is ... kept in heaven for you.” This should shape the way we live each day. At the same time, St. Peter acknowledges that the Christian life is not without hardship: “In this you rejoice, although now for a little while you may have to suffer through various trials.”
