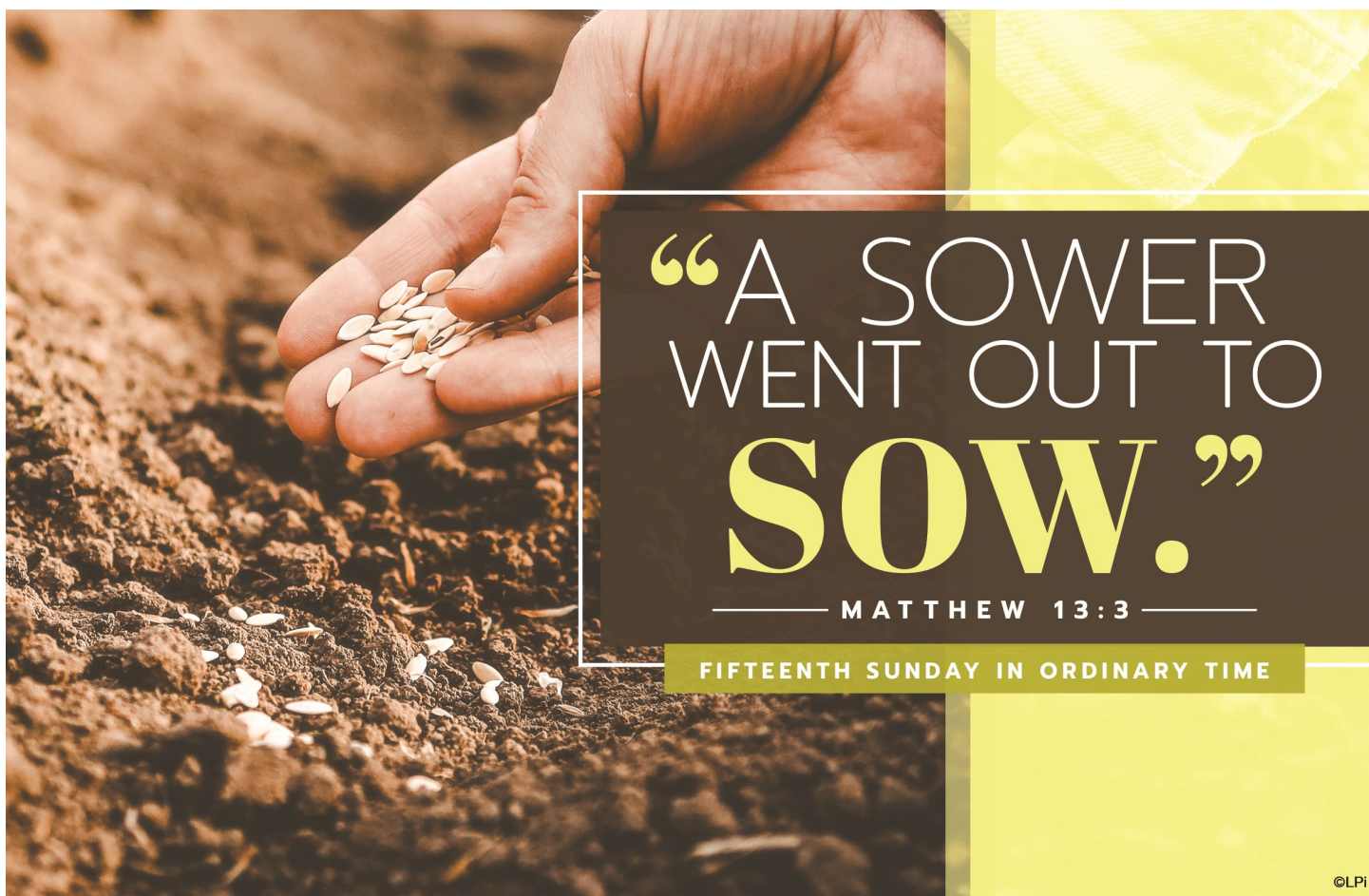

THE FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: The Sower

The scriptures this weekend invite us to trust God's Word even when we don't yet see results. St. Paul reminds us that our present sufferings and longings are real, but they do not have the last word. And in the Gospel, Jesus explains that the "seed" is good, but the heart and conditions determine what kind of harvest we experience. Today's readings all speak about the same rhythm: God speaks, creation responds, hearts decide how to receive, and time finally reveals what God has planted.

In the first reading (Is 55:10–11), the prophet Isaiah uses two images that every listener (especially in the Western Hemisphere) can understand and relate to: rain and snow. Rain comes down, waters the earth, and makes it fruitful. Snow doesn't just fall, it provides moisture and gives life to what will grow. Then Isaiah brings it home: so it is with the word that comes from God. God's speech is not like human talk. Human words can fail, fade, or be forgotten. But God's Word carries divine power. God does not speak only to inform—He speaks to accomplish. So this reading corrects two common attitudes:

- Discouragement, when we think nothing is changing.
- Cynicism, when we treat God's Word as if it were "just inspiration" with no real power. Isaiah insists: God's Word accomplishes what it intends.

A newly ordained priest was having a difficult time preparing his first sermon. He asked his seasoned pastor for a suggestion and his pastor told him, "Start with something that's certain to grab people's attention. For example, you might say, 'Some of the best years of my life were spent in the arms of a woman who was someone else's wife.'" The pastor smiled at the young priest's shocked expression, then added "She was my mother." That Sunday, the nervous young priest ascended the pulpit, sweating and shaking. Finally, he said, "The pastor told me some of the best years of his life were spent in the arms of a woman who was someone else's wife." He was pleased in getting everyone's attention, but his nervousness overtook him, his mind went blank, and he just blurted out, "For the life of me, I can't remember if he said who she was."

I thought that might be an appropriate start for today's parable about growth. As infants we all spent a lot of time in someone's arms, most probably our parents. But somehow, we grew up, started walking, talking, going to school, then eventually driving, working, getting married perhaps, and getting older. When we were young, we couldn't grow up fast enough; now time goes by too fast.

Beginning with this Sunday's Gospel (Mt 13:1–23), we will have three weeks of parables about God's kingdom (or as Matthew likes to call it, "the kingdom of heaven"). Today's story is hardly a parable, which usually has an unexpected ending, but today's outcome is entirely predictable: if we throw seeds on the ground, some of them will grow if the climate is agreeable and there is enough sun and moisture. Should we read Matthew's Gospel from beginning to end, we would see that it describes the various ways people had been responding to Jesus up to this point in His ministry. He was accused of being possessed, of being a breaker of divine law and a blasphemer. Some people thought He was a great healer, and having made them well, they went happily on about their business and didn't think any more about Him. Some enjoyed His stories and were entertained as

long as Jesus was willing to entertain them, but if He asked something difficult of them, they sought other kinds of entertainment. Then there were some who thought He had something worthwhile to say and continued to listen and learn from Him. Jesus was like the farmer sowing the seed. Although He didn't touch all hearts, those whose hearts He touched grew and produced good fruit; that is, their lives were virtuous and pleasing to God.

This week, Jesus tells the Parable of the Sower, as mentioned above. Note that the emphasis isn't first on the farmer's skill. The emphasis is on the ground. Jesus explicitly identifies the seed—the seed is the word of God. That means the Gospel is not primarily about farming. It's about reception, or how we listen. Jesus lists four types of "ground," and we recognize ourselves in them:

1. The Path: The Word is heard but quickly taken away—often because we are distracted or superficial.
2. Rocky Ground: The Word is received with joy, but when trouble or persecution comes, faith cannot root deeply.
3. Thorny Ground: The Word is heard, but worries and desire for other things choke it.
4. Good Ground: The Word is heard, understood, and produces fruit—some a hundredfold, some sixty, and some thirty.

Notice, good ground is not a person without difficulty. Good ground is a person who lets the Word take root, work, and grow. In other words, the Gospel doesn't ask, "Do you enjoy the Word?" It asks, "Does the Word govern you?" Here are some simple ways we can try to live our readings this week:

- Receive the Word with expectation (Isaiah 55:10–11)
- Choose one line of Scripture you hear at Mass and repeat it later that day as a prayer: "Lord, make this bear fruit in me."
- Bring your groaning to God (Romans 8:18–23). When you feel overwhelmed, don't hide it, instead bring it to prayer honestly. Say, "Jesus, I'm waiting, I'm longing, but I belong to You."
- Prepare the ground (your mind) before you listen (Matthew 13:1–23)
- Before prayer or Scripture, remove one distraction for ten minutes (phone face down, notifications off, quiet space). After listening, make one decision that matches what you heard (forgive, apologize, make the call, do the duty with love).
- Watch for thorns and cut one back. Identify one "thorn" in your life—worry, resentment, greed, compulsive scrolling, bitterness—and take one small step to reduce it this week.

God's Word is powerful: it falls like rain and snow, and it accomplishes what it sets out to do. St. Paul assures us that even creation groans with hope and so do we. And Jesus tells us that the harvest depends on the heart that receives the seed. So today, let the Word not stay on the surface. Let it take root. Let it deepen through suffering, cleanse through patience, and mature into fruit for others.

May the Lord bless you with understanding and perseverance, so that His Word in you may grow and bear fruit for life eternal. Amen.

Gospel Question

Jesus teaches his disciples to be open (be "rich soil") to the often mysterious meaning of the parables about the kingdom of Heaven. Are you someone who is open to new or different ideas?
