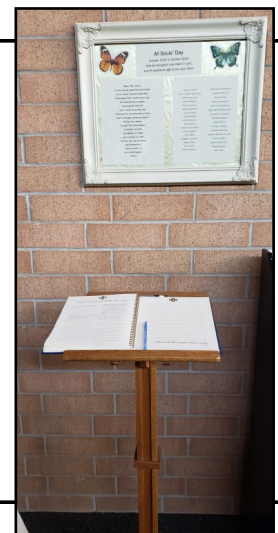

**SIXTEENTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME:
Weeds Among the Wheat**

The readings for this weekend give us a clear picture of God's heart: He is patient and gentle, He helps us pray even when we do not know what to say, and He teaches us to trust the slow, hidden, yet powerful growth of His Kingdom. All three readings remind us of God's justice and mercy, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The Gospel explains why weeds exist alongside wheat and how God will bring everything to its proper harvest. These readings offer both encouragement and challenge for the Christian steward.

In the first reading (Wis 12:13, 16-19), we see that God is patient, and one's sin does not have the last word. God does not treat people harshly just because they fail. God is gentle: He gives chances, and He waits. We may expect rejection due to our sins, but God's way is mercy. The passage also shows that God's power is not expressed through fear—His strength is expressed through forbearance, leading people back to life. We have much we can draw from this very passage in our daily lives:

- When someone fails us, we choose patience before punishment. We can practice mercy at home, at work, and in the parish—especially when we feel quickly disappointed.
- When we fail, we don't collapse into despair. We bring our weaknesses to God rather than hiding them. Mercy is not an excuse for sin, but it is the path back to conversion.

We ask for the "wisdom" to wait. Sometimes the best love is steady, not sudden: praying consistently, speaking truth calmly, and letting God's time work.

There have always been two views of the Church: one exclusive, the other inclusive. The exclusive view holds that the Church is for good people, for the fully committed. In the inclusive view, the Church must be open to all, to the hot, the cold, and the lukewarm, to saints and sinners. For some, the presence of sinners in the Church is a cause of scandal. If they had their way, only saints would be admitted.

The issue of sinners in the Church was a big one for the early Church too. So how did they approach it? Some were all for weeding the sinners out. But others turned to the example of Jesus for guidance. First, they had His practice to guide them. He did not exclude sinners, He welcomed them. Jesus declared that He had come, not to call the just, but sinners to repentance. Then they had His teaching to guide them. The parable about the field in which wheat and weeds grow together until the harvest was a response to this very question.

Human beings are complex. They can't be divided into the good and the bad, as though they were two completely separate classes of people. There is no line you can draw which would neatly separate the good from the bad. Any such line would go right through each human heart, for there is good and evil in every heart. We are all a mixture of good and bad. The people we call "good" may have terrible things in them: bad moods of recklessness, assertion, jealousy, sin. And the so called "bad" people may have in them sorrow, repentance, pity, sacrifice.

So, what should we do? As far as we are concerned, the best thing we can do is take a good look into our own field. If we find some weeds there, as no doubt we will, there is

no law against trying to rid ourselves of them. If we try to do so, we will discover what a painful process this is. As far as others are concerned, we should try to act towards them as Jesus acted. Isn't it strange that He, who had no trace of weeds in Him, could be so understanding towards those who failed to measure up? Why didn't He weed out Judas? And why didn't He weed out Peter? He saw the weeds in Peter's life, but He saw the wheat too. He knew that, with encouragement, the wheat would prevail, and it did.



The Church can do no better than imitate its Founder. It must be big enough and loving enough to hold sinners in the fold. If it did not do so, it would not be the Church of Christ. The suggestion to root out the weeds seems to make a lot of sense, and indeed it has often been tried. Many governments have tried it in fighting terrorists. They wipe out the whole village to get rid of a few terrorists in it! Though attractive, it is not a Christian solution, or even a humane one. A Church that admitted only saints would make about as much sense as a hospital that admitted only people who are well, or a repair shop that accepted only things that are whole.

The Church is not a museum for saints, but a school for sinners. The Church is a temple with a hundred gates, and pilgrims enter from every angle. Through every door, and from all kinds of paths, we enter the house of God on a Sunday morning. Ours is not a Church for those who feel good, but for those who know they are not.

God is a lot more tolerant than we are. Today's reading from the Book of Wisdom says of God, "You are lenient to all ... mild in your judgement ... you govern with great lenience."

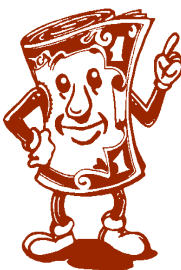
While we distinguish clearly between good and evil, we must aim at being as understanding and tolerant as God is. The time for judgment is not yet. The Kingdom of God is still at the growing stage. Now is the time for conversion. People can change. We can change. Amen.

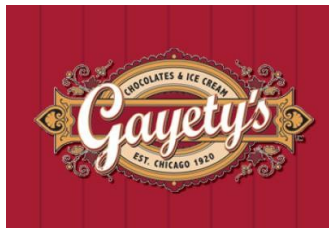

Faith Formation

Another successful year of faith formation at All Souls is in the books. I am proud to say that our program keeps growing with more and more young people getting to know God and developing a relationship with Him.

Here are some of our numbers for this past year:

- 165 students
- 20 catechists & 4 additional volunteers (aides, substitute teachers, etc.)
- 36 students receiving Reconciliation and Eucharist for the first time
- 31 students receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation
- 3 students baptized
- 2 adults fully initiated at the Easter Vigil
- 1 adult converting to the Catholic faith
- 2 adults completing their initiation at the Easter Vigil

Our efforts to involve our Confirmation students in ministries is paying off. Each year, we have students who find a way that they can be an active part of the Church, taking ownership of their faith and living a life of service to others.

As I mentioned last year, we have changed the focus of our program from religious education to faith formation, and I would like to express my gratitude to all of the catechists who took on this challenge with open hearts and minds. They have introduced their students to new ways of exploring and sharing their faith and growing closer to God.

Please consider helping the youth of our parish grow in their faith and love of God by becoming a catechist, aide, or other volunteer. You don't need to be a professionally trained teacher, you only

need a desire to share your faith with others. Please pray for our students and their families, and if you have school-aged children, please enroll them in our All Souls RE/FF. The program is designed to help all kids grow in their faith, not simply to prepare for the sacraments.

Registration is now open, and you can sign your children up online on the parish website: www.allsoulscatholicparish.org/faith-formation/religious-education/. You can also sign up in the parish office during regular business hours, with extended hours on Thursdays, or, if your child was enrolled last year, simply reply to the registration email that we sent out last month. Please let me know if you have any questions or would like to volunteer.

I look forward to continuing my work with the All Souls community.

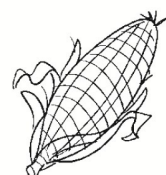
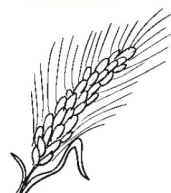
